He played both autoharp and banjo throughout the Appalachian Region starting in the nineteen thirties and continuing into the nineteen nineties, And;

He played autoharp for square dances as well as on a dance boat called the White Swan, And;

Whereas:

He excelled at playing below the chord bar assembly, often resting his 'harp on top of a fifty-five gallon drum, which he used as a resonator; And;

Whereas:

He was always willing to share his expertise with other autoharp players, And;

Whereas:

By way of his autoharp and banjo recording Mountain State Music and a video recording entitled Catching Up with Pesterday, he played a major role in the autoharp renaissance that began in the late twentieth century, And;

Whereas:

His most publicly-played instrument was the autoharp though he was equally well-known as a banjo player and builder, And;

Whereas:

He remained true to his roots and loyally stuck with the autoharp even when the instrument was treated as a stepchild in some music circles, And;

Whereas:

His many accomplishments as a musician, performer, recording artist, and teacher had a very positive impact on the regional and national development and popularity of the autoharp;

Therefore, let it be resolved that Andy Boarman be inducted with highest commendations as the 2012 Posthumous member of The Autoharp Hall of Fame.
